
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

Redhill to Tonbridge Line: Significant cuts to services averted by TLC

No changes until December 2023, with small reductions thereafter. Key school services protected

During the course of the past few weeks, we ha e been in intense discussions with GTR, parent company to Southern Rail, who operate the service between Tonbridge and Redhill a line with which we have recently become more involved following our adoption of Leigh, Pensburst and Edenbridge at last year' AGM.

GTR had previously indicated to us their concern about the need to make company-wide economies. and that the Tonbridge 'branch' needed to share in these. In this connection they had shared with AS proposals which saw a major reduction in the current shuttle service between Redhill and

nhridge at certain times to a less than hourly ervice. ore importantly, the proposals gave no consideration to the line's key user group (school students), or the potential of the line to provide a link between Kent and Gatwick Airport. After reviewing and condemning the GTR proposals as effectively mothballing the line, we compiled a new service pattern which respected GTR's need to reduce costs but retained the mai01ity of services. including school time selvices, and introduced direct services from Tonbridge to Gatwick Airport

Our proposals link to longstanding ambitions across the Southeast to improve connectivity and make better use of available infrastructure. Above all they protect the key user group of the line, school students travelling between Edenbridge and Tonbridge, whilst making better use of the rolling stock and available connections. The proposals were fully worked up, incJuding train wait times, connections with other services, gap utilisations within other service patterns and available platfonn at Gatwick and stations across the

proposed route, therefore giving GTR little room for outright rejection.

We submitted our proposals to GTR and in a subsequent meeting at the beginning of April GTR showed us a new timetable proposal effectively incorporating virtually all our suggestions. They invited comment and stressed that no changes would be introduced before December 2023 at the earliest. We were somewhat surprised that, instead of rejecting the Gatwick extension out of hand, they stated that they were 'working on a proposal which could potentially be extended to Gatwick in the future' and put forward some hurdles which included funding the service. We do not see the issue of funding being a main detractor for the extended service, as the line would see a significant growth in users from across Kent and would be attractive to Kent County Council. Surrey County Council and the operators of Gatwick Airport. Furthermore, we believe the commuter base exists, the suppoti exists, and that the route is viable, therefore we will be pushing GTR to introduce this selvice as soon as practically possible.

Subsequently, GTR have confirmed publicly at a stakeholder event on the 27th March that there will be no changes to the Redhill to Tonbridge service hafora Dacambar

TLC will continue to advocate on behalf of the line as a lifebne for those communities that it serves, as well as tho e more widely potentially benefitting. We believe that without the improved service, and the consequent increase in passenger numbers, the line will continue to be a candidate for cuts and will wither away - harming those who depend upon it today and a lost opportunity for others.



Aims: To restore our pre-pandemic direct services to Paddington. To be a voice for Kintbury, Hungerford and Bedwyn Station passengers. To keep Bedwyn Station as a nice environment and to promote its use along with the bus connection to Marlborough. To maintain and improve train services from Bedwyn, Hungerford and Kintbury.

Story: In 2006 First Great Western were set to halve our off-peak service. This is something we managed to get overturned.

In March 2020 Covid hit, putting us on a diesel shuttle to Reading. This was only three months after the new December 2019 timetable, the best eastbound timetable we'd ever achieved.

Slowly we started to get our bi-mode (direct to Paddington) trains back. But in 2021 cracks were found in the IET bi-mode fleet. Kintbury, Hungerford and Bedwyn were an easy target, we were put on a diesel shuttle to Newbury while the reduced fleet was spread out elsewhere.

Slowly we started to get our bi-mode (direct to Paddington) trains back. However, in 2022, post-Covid, the DfT instructed GWR to make massive cost savings. Again our bi-mode trains were taken away and assigned elsewhere (replacing older expensive to maintain trains) and we were put on diesel shuttles for all of our off-peak and the majority of our evening peak trains.






- The 1157 Bedwyn to Newbury shuttle was held to allow a delayed West of England through (the 0711 off Penzance).
- It was then further held to allow two freight (stone) trains through. Annoyingly the CIS screens showed a 'creeping' delay, as opposed to the reality that the signallers were aware of due to holding it to allow three trains through.
- The 1157 departed Bedwyn at 1209 and arrived in to Newbury at 1230.
- The 1221, off Newbury, connection had already left at 1222.







The Dartmoor Railway Association

The Dartmoor Railway Supporters' Association (DRSA) was formed in 2009 to support the Dartmoor Railway. In 2020 the Dartmoor Railway Community Interest Company went into administration and the Dartmoor Railway effectively ceased to exist. Subsequently ownership of the Aggregate Industries owned line was transferred to Network Rail to enable the reinstatement of an Exeter-Okehampton service operated by Great Western Railway. In preparation for the new challenges ahead, DRSA renamed itself Dartmoor Railway Association (DRA) in May 2021.

The objectives of DRA are:

- 1. To record and promote interest in Okehampton area railway history.
- 2. To support the 'Dartmoor Line' Exeter Okehampton rail service, and Okehampton Station.
- 3. To explore the possibility of operating heritage rail services between Okehampton and Meldon Viaduct.
- 4. To support the Northern Route initiative, i.e. the reinstatement of the entire former London and South Western Railway Exeter Plymouth route.



Tramlines footpath access.

Please note that safety issues have led to the closure of the of the useful flight of steps from Okehampton Station carpark to the Tramlines footpath. To reach the start of the footpath you have to exit the car park and immediately turn right. The area now comes within the Network Rail estate and their risk assessment led to the closure. We have been advised by NR that bringing the steps up to standard would be expensive.

Okehampton Castle

Originally built by the Normans before becoming the Courtenay family residence, Okehampton Castle was Devon's largest castle, and there are substantial remains. It is







- To reopen the branch line from Longniddry to Haddington.
- The group, being environmentally minded, will actively strive to encounter rail travel within its geographical area.







We are delighted that Barbara Mine, the chair of the Friends of Bishopstone Station community rail group, has been named as one of the official Coronation Champions.






