This, below, is what success looks like, for a couple of local Railfuture-affiliated rail user groups from counties at opposite ends of our regional branch area.



<u>ABFLY</u> has a report from <u>The Railway Consultancy Ltd</u> as a firm evidence base for the long-running campaign to increase service frequency on the Hertfordshire line. After crowd-funding to raise the firm's fee, the study has tested the feasibility of <u>options for a passing loop</u> on the line. The favoured one is <u>'the Penryn solution'</u>, an extended single platform part-covered by a passing loop and used at opposite ends by trains travelling in opposite directions along the single-track line. It's now listed as one of the County Council's <u>top ten priorities</u>!

In East Sussex, <u>Cooksbridge Area Rail Action Group</u> are winning a decade-long campaign to boost their long-standing weekdays peaks-only services. GTR promise all-day hourly six-day services in December!

~ participated in the latest occasional meeting of strategic stakeholders for the <u>'High-Speed Hastings'</u> project, which the <u>MP for Hastings & Rye</u> convenes.

~ run our seventh stall at the 20th Uckfield Festival's annual 'Big Day', shown below, at which we launched our new promotional leaflet '*LUcky Garden Village*'

~ developed ideas for GTR's <u>Passenger Benefit Fund</u> at Cooksbridge, Ore, Rye, Three Oaks, Winchelsea.

~ participated in the Community Rail South East inaugural Showcase event at Southampton Harbour.

~ participated in the <u>England's Economic Heartland</u> and <u>South East LEP</u> annual conferences.

- ~ published the monthly <u>Rail User Express</u> for July.
- ~ published the quarterly *railse* and Railwatch.

~ responded to Network Rail's consultation on the proposed upgrade of <u>Norwood Junction station</u>.

~ responded to the Transport for the South East consultation on <u>Becoming a Statutory Body</u>.

~ contributed to Govia Thameslink Railway's request for ideas for their £15m Passenger Benefit Fund.

Our vision for rail: A railway system that provides services which travellers and freight forwarders want to use, and which offers more journey opportunities to more people and more freight.

Beware swallows and Spring (survey)

Now a year on from the problems of the May 2018 timetable changes and the results of Transport Focus' <u>National Rail Passenger Survey</u> from its Spring 2019 survey published on 27 June have led to sighs of relief! The contrasting absence of negative media coverage of this year's May timetable changes was very telling.

In our regional branch area the worst problems were on the Thameslink and Great Northern parts of GTR's network, reviewed below in the first re-appearance of any such table since the March 2017 *railse* no.135!

Comparing national / London & SE overall satisfaction scores for Spring 2019 with Spring 2018: **Overall satisfaction with journey** – national 83%, up 3%; London & South East 83%, up 4%. **Overall satisfaction with station** – national 80%, up 1%; London & South East 80%, up 2%. **Punctuality/reliability** – national 77%, up 5%; London & South East 76%, up 7%. **Value for money for price of ticket** – national 47%, up 2%; London & South East 44%, up 3%. **Level of crowding** – national 72%, up 2%; London & South East 72%, up 4%. **Dealing with delays** – national 40%, up 3%; London & South East 38%, up 3%.

Next to our L&SE TOCs, with their scores for overall satisfaction and national rankings (out of 25 operators, franchised and open access, with Heathrow Connect absorbed into TfL Rail so no comparisons valid yet,) and then after / for L&SE rankings (out of 14, likewise): c2c 85%, down 1%; 14th= / 7th Chiltern Railways 90%, down 1%; 3rd= / 2nd Gatwick Express 89%, up 2%; 6th = / 3rd = Great Northern 77%, down 1%; 25th / 14th Great Western Railway 87%, up 6%; 11th / 6th Greater Anglia 80%, up 4%; 21st= / 11th= Heathrow Express 95%, no change; 1st / 1st London Overground 88%, no change; 10th / 5th South Western Railway 78%, down 2%; 23rd= / 13th Southeastern 80%, up 5%; 21st= / 11th= Southern 81%, up 12%; 20th / 10th TfL Rail - absorbed Heathrow Connect, no data Thameslink 83%, down 3%; 17th= / 9th West Midlands Trains 84%, up 3%; 16th / 8th

Recovery from a low base for some in Autumn 2018 must <u>not</u> disguise change-resistant longer-term trends!
