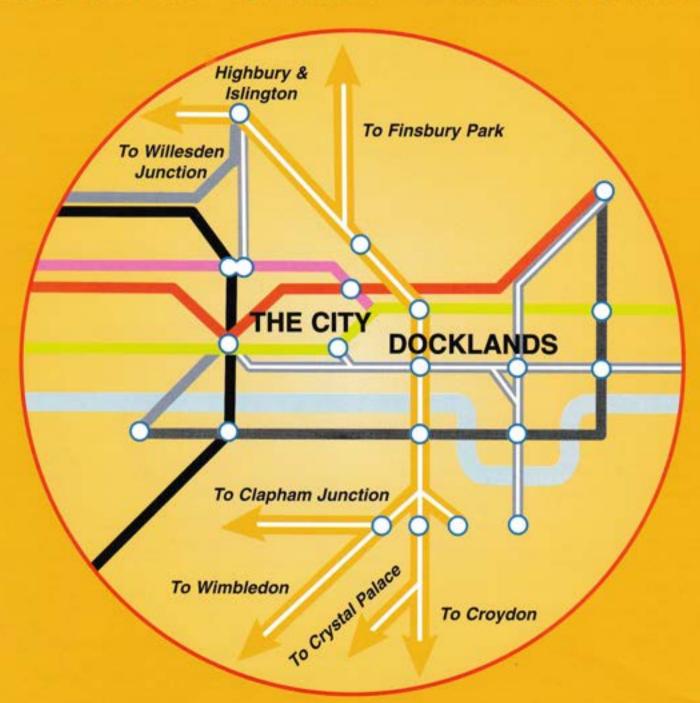

After years of campaigning, construction of the East London Line Extensions is under way. The extensions will deliver transport, regeneration, social inclusion and job creation gains across the capital.

Concerns that construction works could be delayed will not go away and there are risks ahead which could hold up progress. So we are asking all stakeholders and supporters to do everything they can to ensure that the momentum is maintained.

"East London's regeneration is of enormous importance to the capital. The extension of the East London Line, linking with the national rail network and leading towards a new orbital train service for London, has the support of all the boroughs, and of businesses and residents on the route. It would be a disaster if, after years of planning and consultation, the line were to be held back by last minute interventions - just as construction work has got under way."

- London's economy is growing with a new focus on major development areas and the connections between them
- There are more regeneration sites which urgently need transport connections
- London's population is growing so more

transport possibilities are needed

- More people are working in the City and Docklands who need transport links to get to their jobs
- Congestion has got worse and new connections are needed to relieve existing routes

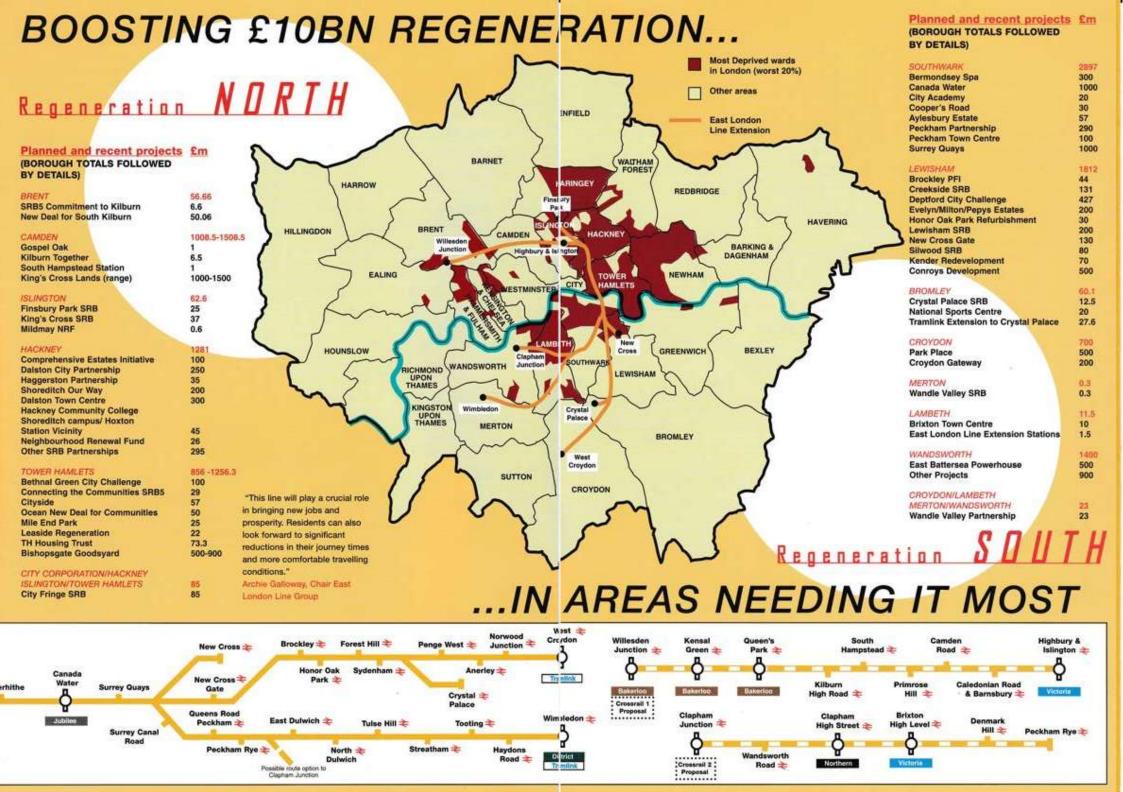

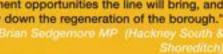
