Harringworth Viaduct

It is the longest masonry viaduct crossing a valley in the United Kingdom. It is approximately three quarters of a mile and is situated on the Northamptonshire/ Rutland border near Corby and Uppingham.

There are 82 arches with an estimated 20million bricks used in its construction. The viaduct was opened in 1878 by the Midland Railway. It is 60ft high at its highest point.

Repair work is currently under way to replace weathered and perished bricks from number seven arch to number one. This work is visible from Gretton Road going underneath the viaduct.

The viaduct, also sometimes known as the Welland viaduct, is on the route of the Jurassic Way long-distance footpath which runs from Banbury, Oxfordshire, to Stamford, Lincolnshire.
